## Iliad Gallery Explores 'Vienna Biedermeier'

NEW YORK CITY — In a new exhibition, "Vienna Biedermeier: The Art of Walnut," Iliad Gallery celebrates its tenth anniversary year by featuring some of the most sought-after examples of Austria's walnut masterworks in the Biedermeier style.

Iliad co-owners Adam Brown and Andrea Zemel say, "The Biedermeier furniture style of 1815 to 1830 is the result of a confluence between history, geography and industrial innovation."

Highlights in the show, which will remain on view through December 30, include a trumeau commode with a drop front desk and vitrine in book matched walnut veneer with engaged columns and carved and gilt capitals, Austria, 1820–25, and a trumpet-shaped, tilt-top pedestal table with book matched walnut veneer and maple inlays, Vienna, circa 1825.

Also presented are a rare sofa attributed to the workshop of Josef Danhauser, with walnut veneer and maple inlays and ebonized detailing; a library table with unusual cog and gear design and tapered Doric columns, Austria, 1830; and an unusual set of four side chairs with heart-shaped backs in walnut veneer with maple inlays, Vienna, 1825–30.

Rounding out the exhibition are a pair of side chairs with vividly figured walnut veneer in an elegant fanback splay, Vienna, 1825; a center hall table with scrolled legs on a tripod base, also created from book matched walnut veneer, Austria, 1830; and another pedestal table with an hexagonal base, Austria, 1830.

For a decade, Iliad has specialized in the fine, somewhat more refined and lighter examples of early Austrian Biedermeier made between 1815 and 1830 that are particularly well suited to walnut. "Our clients tend to prefer these artisan pieces over the heavier and more stoiclooking German ones," Brown adds.
